### STUDENT SCIENCE WRITING COMPETITION 2014

### INFORMATION FOR AUTHORS

In 2014, the Nova Scotian Institute of Science (NSIS), in collaboration with the Situating Science Knowledge Cluster (Halifax), is again sponsoring the its annual Science Student Writing Competition. The science writing competition has two categories: graduate and undergraduate.

A prize of \$500 will be awarded to the winning paper prepared by a graduate student.

A prize of \$250 will be awarded to the best paper prepared by an undergraduate student.

The winning submissions will be posted on the NSIS and Situating Science Knowledge Cluster websites and the authors will be invited to submit the paper to the *Proceedings of the Nova Scotian Institute of Science*. All articles published in the *Proceedings* are subject to the normal review process by the Editor.

All students registered at a University in Nova Scotia are eligible.

#### **Introduction:**

Entries submitted to the writing category of the 2014 Competition should be either:

1. Original Research: A submission involving original research findings, i.e. your own research, or research in which you have participated, is welcomed. Submissions should include insights into the significance of the research and its application.

#### 2. Review Article:

(a) A paper that provides a scientific review of historic and current literature in your field of interest that provides a new analysis or perspective. Your own insights and comments on the significance of this research and its relevance should be noted.

(b) A paper directed to a non-specialist audience reviewing some aspect of science and its relevance and/or its application.

All submissions will be judged according to the following criteria:

- Scientific value of topic,
- Explanation of scientific application and relevance,
- Presentation and quality of writing

**Format of Articles Submitted:**

The format should not exceed 6 pages. The word count in the *Proceedings* is about 650/page; thus you should aim for about 3200-3900 words total; references excluded. Diagrams and graphs can be included within that page length and are usually printed across the full page width. One page of text in the *Proceedings* (19 x 11 cm or 7.5 x 4.5 inch) is equivalent to about 650 words. Black and white photos can be considered. It is suggested that you aim your writing at the general scientific community. The *New Scientist* or *Scientific American* can serve as a model. Avoid unnecessary jargon or acronyms.

**Submissions:**

The deadline for the author to provide a “**Notification of Intent**” to enter the 2014 Competition, by regular mail or e-mail, to the Competition Coordinator at the address below is:

**Friday, 27 December, 2013.**

This notification should include the following information:

- your name and current address (home or departmental), with e-mail and/or telephone number;
- the name of your University and home department;
- the name of your program and your current year in that program;

The deadline for the author to submit the “**Final Entry**” to the science writing competition is:

**Friday, 21 February 2014.**

Electronic submission is strongly preferred. Please submit an electronic copy of your article as a Word (or equivalent) file as an attachment in an e-mail to the Competition Coordinator at the e-mail address below. If electronic format is unavailable, you may submit a paper copy (21.5 x 28 cm or 8.5 x 11 inch) to the postal address below.

Please include a covering note with your entry giving your University affiliation, the name of your academic program and your current year. If you are submitting original data, include the name of your research supervisor and provide a statement that both your supervisor, and, if applicable, any co-worker(s) involved in the work, have agreed to including the data in your article. All personal or scientific information that you provide will be held in confidence.

**Winners:**

The winners of the 2014 NSIS science writing competition will be contacted before the end of March 2014. The winning entries will be announced on the websites of both the NSIS and the Situating Science Cluster (Halifax). The presentation of the awards will take place at the Museum of Natural History auditorium, 1747 Summer St., Halifax, **Monday, 7 April 2014.**
